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Paraphrasing Summarising And Synthesising Exercises

Paraphrasing is not summarising. Summarising is when you give an overview of the author's key ideas as a whole, or provide an overview of a topic. A summary is usually shorter than the original piece of writing. It might state the ideas of a paragraph in one simple sentence. A summary tells you about the whole passage. For example. Original:

Paraphrasing and summarising allow you to develop and demonstrate your understanding and interpretation of the major ideas/concepts of your discipline, and to avoid plagiarism. Paraphrasing and summarising require analytical and writing skills which are crucial to success at university.

Synthesis is an important thinking/writing skill. It is similar to both summarizing and paraphrasing in that it involves rewriting other people's ideas in your own words. Both summarizing and paraphrasing involve the use of one text at a time. Synthesising is a more complex skill in that it draws together the ideas of more than one text at a time.
