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Start a new page for your Reference list. Centre the title, References, at the top of the page. Double-space the list. Start the first line of each reference at the left margin; indent each subsequent line five spaces (a hanging indent). Put your list in alphabetical order. Alphabetize the list by the first word in the reference.

APA has a few formatting guidelines for the reference list. The reference list should start on a separate page at the end of your paper. Use one-inch margins and continue the header from the rest of your paper. Title the page References, centered at the top (no bold, italics, quotation marks, etc.).

Label the first page of your back matter, your comprehensive list of sources, " Bibliography " (for Notes and Bibliography style) or " References " (for Author-Date style). Leave two blank lines between " Bibliography " or " References " and your first entry.

Create a list of references, one for each item cited in the paper, in a section called "References". This section goes at the end of your paper. The references are to be alphabetized by the fist author's last name, or (if no author is listed) the organization or title.

To address these problems it is not enough to know that money makes a difference; we need to understand how.
